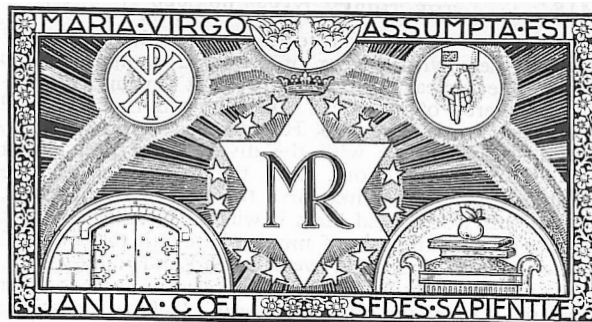

**Our Lady of
Perpetual Help**
Novena, June 18-26
Feast Day June 27

The miraculous picture of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is supposed to have been painted on a piece of wood in the 13th century, but may date back to St. Luke. In the 15th century it was brought to Rome by a pious merchant and is now venerated in the Church of St. Alphonsus, in charge of the Redemptorist Fathers. The feast was established in 1871 by Pius IX. Of all heavenly patrons, Mary is your most powerful helper before the throne of God. Her dignity of Mother of God, her ardent charity, and the fact that Jesus gave her to you as Mother, enable her to obtain for you through her intercession more than all the angels and saints can obtain. When you are in need, remember you have a kind Mother to help you – the Mother of Perpetual Help.

“When Jesus, therefore, saw His Mother and the disciple standing by, whom He loved, He said to His Mother, ‘Woman, behold thy son.’ Then He said to the disciple, ‘Behold thy Mother’ ” (John 19,25).

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Modernism, something like a computer virus, gets into every dogma in your head and alters its meaning. So although the Modernist can sincerely recite the creed, the meaning which he places upon these dogmas has little or nothing to do with the meaning which the Catholic Church places upon them.

Ratzinger is a perfect example. If asked, he would recite the Apostles' Creed just as I would. But when the creed says *the resurrection of the dead*, I believe that the separated souls which are either in Heaven, Hell, or Purgatory will be reunited to their bodies, and will then be judged by Jesus Christ. Does Ratzinger also believe this? No. He says this about the resurrection of the dead: **"It now also becomes clear that the real heart of the faith in resurrection does not consist at all in the idea of restoration of bodies, to which we have reduced it in our thinking; such is the case even though this is the pictorial image used throughout the Bible."** Further on he says **"...where the 'communion of saints' is an article of faith, the idea of the *anima separata* ('the separated soul' of Scholastic theology) has in the last analysis become obsolete."** Two pages later, in addressing what is meant by the essential immortality of man, he says: **"It [the human person] goes on existing because it lives in God's memory."** This indeed would be a most extraordinary phenomenon, since God does not possess a memory. He sees all reality, past, present, and future, as existing in one present moment.

This is merely one of many cases in which the traditional meaning of the dogma, which can be found not only throughout Sacred Scripture, but also in any Catholic catechism in any period of the Church, and which was defined by the Fourth Lateran Council, is completely sucked out of the dogmatic formula by the Modernist Ratzinger. In its place is an outright denial of the resurrection of the dead, explained as merely living on in God's memory, which, as I said, does not exist. This denaturization of the dogma and its transformation into heresy occurs or can occur anywhere in the Modernist's mind, since the Modernist is a heretic, and does not believe with supernatural faith the truths revealed by God and proposed by the Roman Catholic Church. Each dogma is reduced to "truth as I see it." Sometimes the Modernist accepts the traditional meaning of the dogma; sometimes he does not. Whatever he believes, however, he believes not on the authority of God revealing and the Catholic Church proposing; he believes it because *he* thinks it is so.

Those who have donated to our building fund have been exceptionally generous. Unfortunately there are only fifty-one households which have donated a total of about \$110,000. There are many, many more households who will benefit from the priests who emerge from this seminary. They are failing to do their fair share in the construction and support of the seminary, and are essentially profiting from the hard work and generosity of others.

A priest is something which functions for a long time. I will be ordained thirty-five years on June 29th of this year. If God grants me good health, I will see perhaps fifty years of priesthood one day.

Now I ask you, would you pay \$1000 for a car that would last in all probability for fifty years? Cars like these would be in such high demand that no company could keep up with it. As necessary as a car is for our earthly journeys, a priest is ever more necessary, since he is indispensable for our journey towards Heaven by his power to say Mass, by his fidelity to Catholic truth, and by his apostolic zeal for the salvation of souls. We could much more easily do without a car than without a priest.

So the investment in a priest's training is really very little when considered in the long term. A donation of \$1000 towards our building fund amounts to about 5 cents a day for the priest, if he should be a priest for fifty years. Is a priest not worth 5 cents a day for you, for your children, and your grandchildren? What things in life are so inexpensive as a priest?
