Novus Ordo and non-practicing Catholics may not serve as sponsors. The Church will provide a sponsor in case of necessity. The Churching of New Mothers follows the baptismal ceremony. Please make arrangements through the church office.

✠ OUR LADY AND SAINT ANTHONY

FIRST FOR OUR LADY

The first Religious Orders of Women to found converts in our land were especially dedicated to Our Lady: the CARMELITES came in 1790; the first SISTERS of CHARITY founded a Convent in Baltimore in 1809; the VISITATIONS came in 1816; but the first Order of Religious Women in the United States with no affiliation with any existing Order was founded by Father Nerinckx and called the FRIENDS OF MARY at the FOOT OF THE CROSS, or the SISTERS OF LORETTO.

The first Act of Consecration to the Sacred Heart of Mary was published in the country in 1792 by the Jesuits for their students of Georgetown.

The first Hymn book published in this country contained 136 hymns in honor of OUR LADY. In 1819, the first American book printed entirely devoted to Our Lady was "The Imitation of the Blessed Virgin" by Fr. Francis Aroas, S. J.

Our Lady seemed to love to have FIRST events in our history fall on her feast days: When the Maryland Pilgrims under Lord Baltimore landed in 1634, the FIRST MASS was celebrated on LADY DAY - the ANNUNCIATION - and their FIRST CITY and CHURCH were at ST. MARY'S CITY on the ST. MARY RIVER, a tributary of the Chesapeake which a century before bore Our Lady's name.

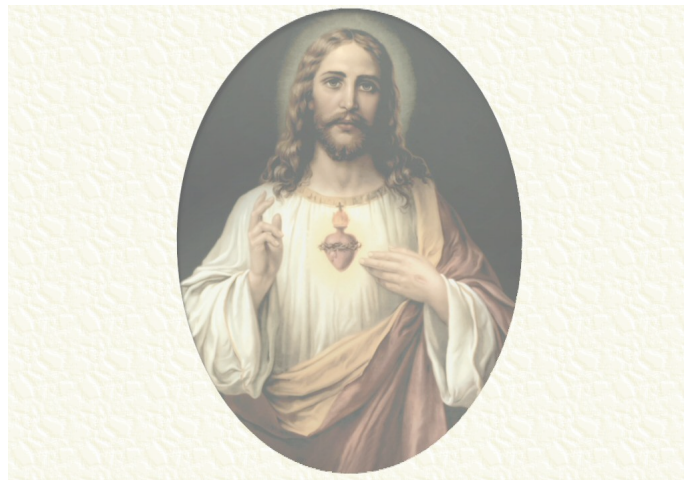
